



Second group of 50 students complete training in textile fabrica

Fifty trainees in high-level cloth fabrication at Gaculiro VTC (Kigali) under the support of Reborn Kyoto on Friday awarded certificates after a 10-month training course in making Japanese clothes (Kimonos) different styles of garments. They include 42 females and 8 males.

The fifty beneficiaries follow another group of forty-eight trainees (44 females and 4 males) who comp the same course in June 2014.

This training in garment manufacturing is conducted by Rwandan trainers together with Japanese expe tailoring of high standard Japanese clothes fabrication skills (Kimonos) as well as 'made in Rwanda fast

The Charge d'Affaires from the Japanese embassy in Rwanda Tomio Sakamoto told beneficiaries of this training to constantly put in practice skills acquired in order to improve their standards of living.

One of the beneficiaries Marie Paul Mutuyeyezu said that their group is ready to use their skills after 1 a cooperative under the support of Kigali city. City authorities have pledged to help them set up a small medium enterprise, locally known as Agakiriro.
